Today, Multnomah County District Attorney Rod Underhill announced that 29-year-old Bobby Scott Domingo-Walker, who goes by the name of Robert Michael Walker, changed his plea and received a 30 month prison sentence after he fled from police, crashed into a vehicle and then forced his way into a nearby residence.

This investigation started on May 22, 2019 when a Portland Police officer attempted to conduct a traffic stop on a vehicle being driven by Domingo-Walker. Instead of immediately stopping, Domingo-Walker drove eastbound across the Steel Bridge at a high rate of speed.

Ultimately, Domingo-Walker ran a red light and t-boned a vehicle near the intersection of Northeast Multnomah Street and Northeast Wheeler Avenue in Portland, Oregon. After the crash, Domingo-Walker exited the vehicle he was driving and ran northbound on Northeast Wheeler Avenue.

In an attempt to locate Domingo-Walker, a police K-9 unit responded and tracked his location to the 200 block of North Broadway Avenue.

During the investigation, police learned Domingo-Walker forced his way inside an unoccupied apartment. He refused to surrender when contacted by police. While police set up containment around the apartment, Domingo-Walker climbed into an adjacent unit. Police eventually took Domingo-Walker into custody without further incident.

Domingo-Walker told investigators that when the officer attempted to stop him in downtown he made several evasive turns in an attempt to ditch police. As Domingo-Walker approached the Moda Center, he started honking his horn to get pedestrians and bicyclists out of the way because of his poor driving.

Domingo-Walker told police he ran from the crash scene because he feared the driver of the other vehicle may have been seriously injured. The driver suffered non-life threatening injuries.

Domingo-Walker pleaded guilty to one count of burglary in the first degree, one count of failing to perform the duties of a driver, and felony attempting to elude police. He will also have to pay \$1,500 in restitution to the victim of the hit and run.

Upon his release, Domingo-Walker will be on three years of post-prison supervision and will have his driving privileges revoked for at least one year.

"The victim of the car crash could have been seriously injured because of Mr. Domingo-Walker's driving and we're very fortunate that she was not," said Multnomah County Deputy District Attorney Brad Kalbaugh, who handled the resolution of this case.

The Multnomah County District Attorney's Office recognizes Portland Police Officer Bradley Jett and the Portland Police Bureau's Street Crimes Unit for their dedicated efforts investigating this case.

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
